



About the Director

About the Producer

About the Designers

Drew Fitzsimmons (Set Design) – is thrilled to be designing his second set for Susan, the last being *Becky's New Car*. Drew has designed and constructed many sets at Kentwood and beyond. Director's Note

Jean-Baptiste Poquelin (1622-1673), also known as Molière, was a French comedic actor and playwright. Mixing traditional French comedy with *Commedia dell'arte*, he composed 36 major works, including *The Misanthrope*, *Tartuffe*, *The Miser*, and *The Bourgeois Gentleman*. Most of his plays center on a foolish rich man who is taken advantage of by those around him—in this case, doctors and the medical profession. Ill with tuberculosis at the time, Molière wrote the part of Argan for himself so that he could remain seated while he performed. Sadly, *The Imaginary Invalid* (also known as *The Hypochondriac*) was his last play, as he collapsed during the fourth and last performance and died shortly afterward. With my own background in medicine, I was attracted to this play in particular since so many of the issues it brings up—mounting medical expenses, perceived barriers to health care access, quack cures, unscrupulous legal professionals and gold-digging spouses—still feel relevant today.

In the late 17th century, medicine was still quite primitive. Many doctors still subscribed to the Greek philosophy of disease being caused by an imbalance of the four humors - blood, phlegm, black bile and yellow bile - and refused to believe that blood actually circulated through the body. Few true cures of any kind were available, and medical practitioners had to make do with bleeding, purging, tonics and ointments as their sole treatment methods. The germ theory of disease was not even proposed until the mid-1800s.

Several of the character's names inform their roles in the play. Toinette is close to "tinette," or "funnel," as well as "toilette." Fleurant means "giving off an odor," Bonnefoi means "good faith," Angélique means "angelic," and Dr. Diafoirus' name comes from the French word "foirer," which means "to have diarrhea." Purgon comes from "purge." Béline may be derived from "béliér," or "sheep," in that she is pulling to wool over Argan's eyes. Louison's name may be an homage to Louis XIV, who was King of France in Molière's day.

My thanks to the Kentwood Board for allowing me to adapt and direct this first KP production of a work by Molière. Please excuse any anachronisms as we are not concerned about being true to period by design or necessity.
